Palm Springs 2018 Districting Public Participation Kit Map

My map has five districts. I have tried to keep neighborhoods in tact as well as use main streets in the city when dividing the area into districts

Five districts allow more people to be represented and allows for possible future growth in areas of the city now not developed.

The districts will have one will council person represent them. This allows for more representation of citizens as districts are between 8000-9000 homes.

The districts include areas where higher minority populations exist. It was stated in one planning meeting that the North End Gateway and Highland Estates did not want to be included in the Las Palmas District.

In having five districts the council will consist of five council members eliminating the title and position of "Mayor". Mayor position will become President of the City Council. This was also a citizen's suggestion from planning meetings. The President of the City Council will have equal say and power in decisions made by the council. The President will be elected by the members of the council. The President of The Council will lead the city council meeting.

The initial representative President shall be the longest serving member of the council at the time of implementation of the district election. A President of the City Council may serve up to two consecutive years by vote of the council members. The President of the City Council will rotate among council members and be elected yearly or bi yearly by council members.

All council members can represent the city at functions and ceremonial events. Council members have sub-committee obligations and can be the city representative at functions of those committees or events. This allows all members to be involved in ceremonial civic events, allowing a broader range of ideas and representation. Any council member can give the State Of The City Address.

The City of Palm Springs formerly was a five member council and rotated the position of president. As the city is greater in new housing developments but relatively the same year around population the District alignment serves the year around residents by having direct knowledge of neighborhood concerns.state

For a four-district map, each district must include between 10,581 and 11,695 people, and as close to 11,138 as possible.

For a five-district map, each district must include between 8,465 and 9,356 people and as close to 8,910 as possible.

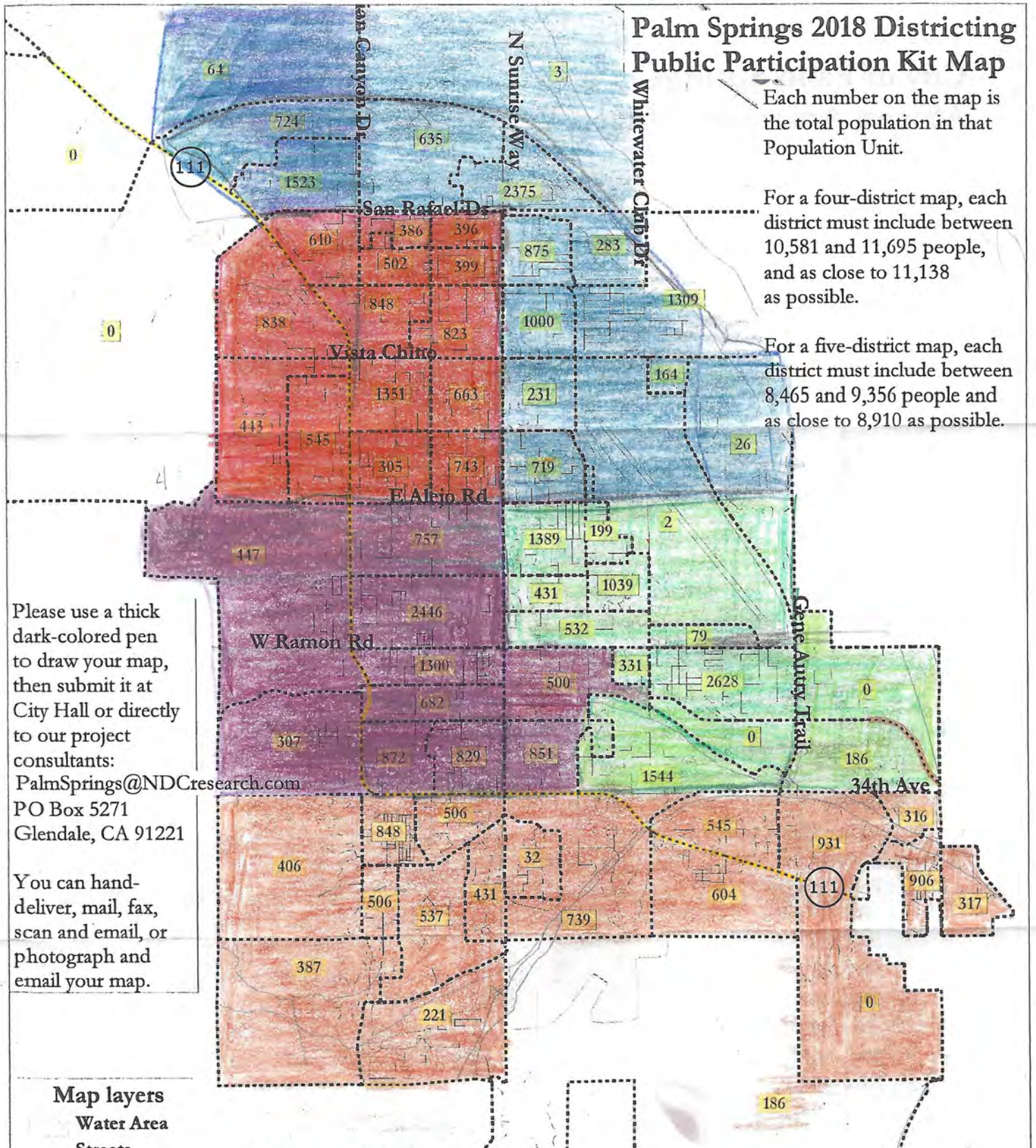

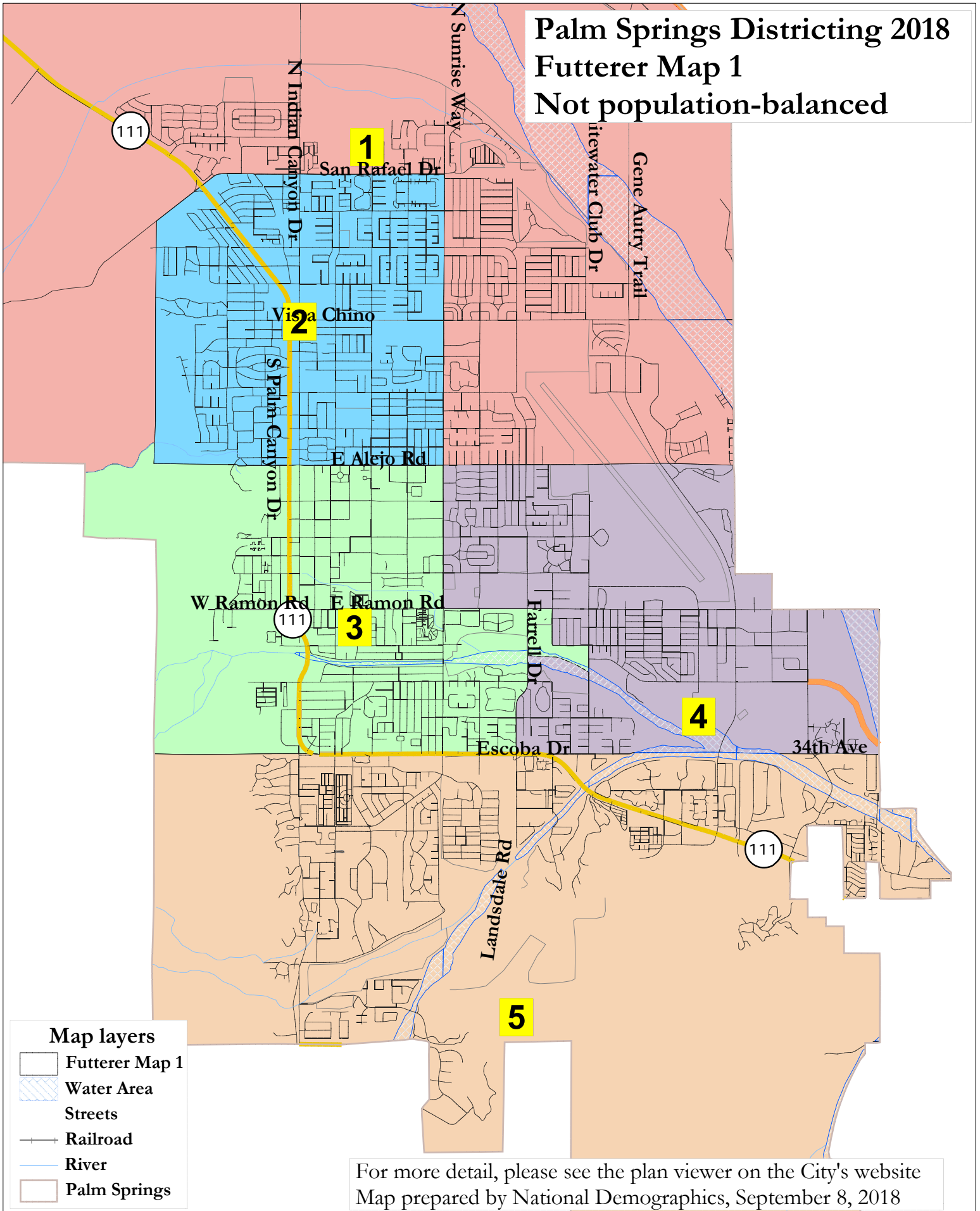
